SKILLS & COMPETENCIES TO BE DEVELOPED	<ul> <li>1.Confident, Self-Directed Learners: Geography students become confident individuals with a strong sense of right and wrong, adaptability, and effective communication skills. They are self-directed learners who question, reflect, and take responsibility for their own learning.</li> <li>2.Active Contributors: Students are innovative and effective team players, taking initiative and calculated risks to strive for excellence and contribute positively to their communities.</li> <li>3.Concerned Citizens: Students develop a strong sense of civic consciousness and global awareness, actively participating in the betterment of society and using tools such as maps, fieldwork, and GIS to understand and address real-world issues.</li> </ul>
POST-SECONDARY OPPORTUNITIES	Geography students develop essential skills such as critical thinking, spatial awareness, data analysis, and the ability to address environmental and societal challenges. This disposition helps them understand complex societal issues and encourages them to form reasoned conclusions.</li> <li>Respect and Empathy for Diversity: Students should cultivate a sense of respect and empathy for different cultures, backgrounds, and perspectives. This disposition helps them appreciate Singapore's multicultural society and navigate interactions with people from various walks of life. It also promotes social harmony and inclusivity.</li> </ul>


#### Attitude
